WHAT MAKES US pecial?



Special Olympics Northern California raised awareness for program participants and increased opportunities for our community to get involved in 2023 through a number of large-scale organizational initiatives.

DO "SOMETHING SPECIAL" CAMPAIGN

Our first-ever brand campaign helped redefine what it means to be 'special' within the Special Olympics movement and ignited momentum in our larger NorCal community. Addressing the preconceived notions of what it's like to live with an intellectual disability, we showcased NorCal athletes reclaiming the word 'special' as a thing of power: "Special isn't what we are. It's what we do."

Athlete Leaders are local Special Olympics participants who take the opportunity to grow through virtual and in-person skill-based classes, presentation opportunities, and chances to take on leadership roles. These skills and trainings help open doors for Athlete Leaders to succeed at school, work, and in the community.

More than 100 Athlete Leaders were at the forefront of Special Olympics NorCal in 2023 and represented us at the State and US Capitols, in the "Do Something Special" campaign, on the Board of Directors and more.



COMMUNITY | We're **Better** Together

Athletes and their families benefit from Special Olympics NorCal programs at no cost and are elevated into the spotlight thanks to generous community donors and partnerships. We are grateful for the ongoing support of local community groups; businesses like Safeway, Flyers Energy, and Central Valley Starbucks locations; volunteers; donors; and professional teams such as the San Francisco 49ers, Sacramento Republic FC, San Jose Earthquakes, Oakland A's, San Jose Sharks, and Sacramento Kings, as well as the Bay Area Sports Hall of Fame and San Jose Sports Hall of Fame.

Our inclusive movement has ignited change at the highest levels, including direct multi-year support from the **State of California**. Special Olympics is also at the grassroots level with annual funding from **Santa Clara County**, local fundraising, and volunteerism from law enforcement. Hundreds of agencies work with us throughout the year to raise funds, volunteer at competitions, and form mutually-beneficial relationships with our athletes and families. In the past year, local law enforcement has **raised more than \$1.4M** for Special Olympics NorCal!
